What happens during a school trip to the CCA?



Your visit will be facilitated by the CCA's Learning Coordinator who will engage your pupils with contemporary art and ideas. The visit will be focused on the current exhibition and themes, aiming to give pupils the opportunity to develop their self-expression, confidence, collaboration and creative making skills. School trips are designed in relation to the curriculum and will be driven by making and experimentation.

What is the main exhibition programme for 2024/25?

The CCA is a contemporary art gallery with an exciting and thought-provoking exhibition programme. We have three exhibitions per year, each with a public programme.

The exhibition programme for 2024/25 proposes a relooking at the personal mythologies of our exhibiting artists and their connection to larger questions around Scottish diaspora, place-making, and world-building. These themes have consistently occurred in parallel to dominant ideologies and worldviews. Through artmaking, the artists continue in their attempt to provide pathways to navigate our current moment and suggest proposals for the future.

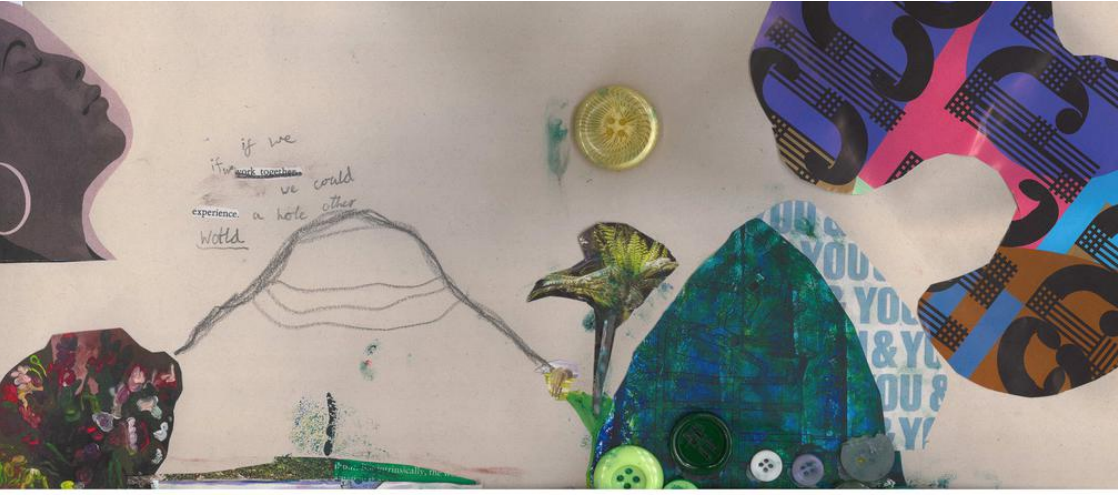

What to bring

The CCA will provide all materials, supported by the Glasgow Communities and Place Fund.

There will be a short 15-minute break during your visit.

Pupils are welcome to bring a snack with them to have during this time. There will be access to water during the trip, however, we ask pupils to bring a water bottle.

You are welcome to stay after the visit/arrive early to have lunch. You must inform the CCA staff before you visit if you opt for this option.

Expectations

School visits to CCA are completely free. If you are unable to attend the visit please inform us as soon as you can so we can offer the school trip to another school. As a minimum, we expect at least five working days notice.

A typical school visit

We recommend your visit lasts 2 hours 30 minutes, however we understand that this does not always fit with your school's timetable. We are happy to reduce the length of the school trip if needed. We can accommodate a morning or afternoon visit.

Pupils are encouraged to engage with the exhibition at their own pace, consider how artworks are made and the messages and meanings. After looking at the exhibition, we will engage in a discussion.

After a short break, we will get creative and engage in a creative workshop that is inspired by the themes and ways of making. Pupils are encouraged to work collaboratively and develop their artistic skills.

Access

The entrance to the CCA is on an equal level to Sauichall Street. The main exhibition space and the Learning Space are both on the ground floor of the CCA.

Toilets

Accessible toilets can be found on the ground floor. More toilets can be found on the first floor. All toilets are gender-neutral. Toilets are also in use by the general public.

Guidelines for group leaders

After a short break, we will get creative and engage in a creative workshop that is inspired by the themes and ways of making. Pupils are encouraged to work collaboratively and develop their artistic skills.

Risk Assessment link / First Aid Information

We will send you a basic risk assessment for the exhibition and the physical space. We ask you to expand on this risk assessment to make it personal to you and your pupils.

Although there will be first-aid trained staff at the CCA, group leaders should be the first point of contact to administer first-aid.

Travel Arrangements

You should have informed the CCA staff via email/phone what your travel arrangements are. If you are running late please inform the CCA staff by calling 0141 352 4919.

Public Bus

There is a bus stop outside the O2 ABC building, next to CCA, where First Bus services 3, 4/4A, 18 and 19, amongst others, stop (coming from the west end of the city). Buses from the city centre and south side (First Bus services 3, 4/4A, 18 and 19) stop on Bath Street, just before the King's Theatre - a three-minute walking journey with two level crossings from CCA. The 3 and 4/4A also stop at Hope Street by Glasgow Central train station before continuing to Bath Street.

Train

The nearest train station is Charing Cross, which is about a five-minute journey from CCA. Queen Street and Glasgow Central are around fifteen minutes away.

Subway

The closest Underground station is Cowcaddens, which is around a five-minute walking journey from CCA.

Meeting point

The main entrance to the CCA is at 350 Sauchiehall St, Glasgow, G2 3JD. A CCA staff member will greet you at the main entrance.
