THE SKINNY



Two great festivals carry us through the darkest part of the year – Celtic Connections and Glasgow Film Festival. Both are big beasts, festivals that evolve in scale and depth each year, enriching the winter months. In the CCA galleries and, importantly beyond the gallery too, we have Forms of Action. This is a large ambitious exhibition that presents a series of artists who have socially engaged art practices, making visible in the gallery the ideas that have fuelled our public engagement programmes in CCA and with our partners across the city. Look out too for the launch of a publication on the same subject midway through the exhibition.

Upstairs in Intermedia Gallery there will be projects by Francesca Hawker and David Haslam, and Collins & Goto Studio while in the Creative Lab there are residencies by Katherine MacBride and Jamie Kane

This year's Stephen Campbell Trust Lecture moves beyond visual art to an investigation of the French poet Arthur Rimbaud, a radical figure who has influenced many artists across the twentieth century despite the brevity of his own career. If Rimbaud evokes a longing for the classic days of counterculture then this may be the right time to explore Paul Michael Henry & Alessandra Campoli's Butoh workshops in January or, in a slightly different vein, Matchbox Cineclub's history of Turkish exploitation cinema.

In terms of music we have a season full of classics – Anna Meredith will be here as part of Celtic Connections while Na h-Òganaich, one of Gaelic music's gems, will visit in early February. You'll want to see The Mastersons too – they've played in Steve Earle's band and their own music is in the same league.

In February there is the first sighting of a major new research project in Scotland: Cruising the 1970s. Over two days there will be a series of screenings, talks and readings exploring queer print culture and archiving ephemera.

UPTIGHT UPRIGHT UPSIDE DOWN MARVIN GAYE CHETWYND

Until Sun 8 January

For her first full solo show in Scotland, Marvin Gaye Chetwynd revisits and extends some of her earlier works transforming the exhibition spaces in CCA into a set. Proposing ideas and sharing information on what might liberate people, in an interactive live cinematic proposal, Uptight upright upside down attempts not to shape the world, but rather to visually offer an extension to it.

One of the works being developed for the show is Hermitos Children, an ongoing project of which the third chapter will be presented. It takes the form of an experimental television crime drama. Each episode follows female detective Joan Shipman as she uncovers and solves sex-crimes. The film combines staged cinematic sequences with footage of live performances. Rather than documenting events chronologically, Chetwynd combines both scripted and live elements into a single overarching narrative. The artist describes her work as 'impatiently made', often re-using cheap materials that are easy to process and to use by the many performers she invites to play a role. The collective invitation to develop and make the work are at the core of Chetwynd's practice, drawing on models of family organisation and models of mixed economies, while demonstrating a willingness to abandon the idea of autonomy as an artist. The notion of play and the importance of playful imagination are given serious consideration.

Beyond the idea of absurdism or illustrations, Chetwynd's characters, sets, props and costumes embody an ever-changing image of our futures. Quick snippets might become permanent states and loose views can be fixed viewpoints. In this imagination that is constantly shaken and flipped, 'out of this world' becomes 'into this world' and imagination might be closer to reality than it appears.

Forms of Action will explore current international developments in socially engaged art practices, looking at both form and content. It also aims to present a diverse series of approaches that transform spectatorship and the role of artists in society. This exhibition forms part of a significant shift from a more traditional understanding of art and its usual environment, in to an understanding of art in the cut and thrust of ordinary life. As this takes place, it is beginning to influence a genuine change in art practice.

In that very spirit, the exhibition will underline the validity of these approaches as artistic projects in themselves, and not solely as social development strategies. Participating artists will address a diverse range of issues, including, but not limited to, the socio-cultural implications of food and agriculture; second wave feminism; material studies; written language and radical gardening, using storytelling, sound, photography, performance, graphic reportage and other creative interventions. The exhibition seeks not to document outcomes, but rather, illustrate practices. The main focus of Forms of Action is the implementation of art and creativity as a way to address issues in society. Art becomes the 'how' to transform reality rather than the 'what' to be delivered to specific audiences.

CCA is currently expanding its institutional vision to repurpose itself according to the emerging urgencies related to engagement. Our first priority is to merge different visions coming from around the world, and create temporary, but significant, platforms where a fruitful cultural exchange can be achieved.

Forms of Action will retain many of the usual parameters of a traditional exhibition, in order to give focus to artistic approaches that reflect the changing dynamics between art and society. It seeks to present the connection between art and society as a valuable source for all involved: artists, curators, and public audiences, and for the future development of art practice in general. Forms of Action's main interest is in civic commitment rather than in the dispensation of concrete solutions. Our goal is to interrogate our current condition by asking how art can be used as a socially motivated and motivating tool for change.





CCA: Editorial

PUBLIC, SOCIAL AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

CCA's public engagement programme launched in September 2015 and now – after a year and a half of activity – is a good time to pause for a moment to look back at what we have achieved so far. Taking the time to reflect is what allows us to move forward, make new plans for the future, and envision what will come later.

It is also an opportunity to share more in depth definitions of some of the terms we have been using so far, such as socially engaged art practice, civic practice and participation, as well as to explain how CCA applies these within the variety of formats we are using in the public engagement programme.

The definition of socially engaged art practice is directly connected with the term 'social practice' which is quite common within the North American art context. However the definition of social practice, from which socially engaged art has emerged, obscures the word art. Those who use this term consciously choose it as a way of underlining their critical detachment from other forms of art-making. It is a choice connected with the definition of the practice in itself, as well as with the position of the artist within broader society.

It is therefore natural to ask why should this 'social practice' be art at all? What relevance does art have in this practice? Some practitioners solve this issue by referring to themselves using other terminology, mostly appropriated or used by other disciplines, such as gardener, activist or ethnographer, among others. This may be a more comfortable way of thinking of these artists individually and personally, but does not really solve the problem of the importance the role these practitioners have when interacting with social practice.

On a more practical level, what this sort of approach means is that the artists are developing projects that are more process-based than object-oriented; where the outcome is the process itself, rather than a final work. They also work with people, community groups and organisations with which they share authorship, and often ownership, of the project.

The philosopher Stephen Wright calls this 'stealth' art practice, in which the artist in the real world is a secret agent with an artistic agenda. We might call this civic art. The term civic allows us to underline the connection with the city, and the aim to re-empower local people, which is arguably rather more important than how hidden or visible the artist is as an agent in current society. CCA approaches this by embedding itself in the site, together with people and communities. We go out from our building; we work with community gardens, bars, restaurants, collectives and individuals based across the city. We reach these groups and people directly in their location, rather than solely bringing them in to the CCA premises. We have also initiated a series of commissions from two artists whose work focuses on social engagement: Jonas Staal and Kathrin Böhm. We will be working with them for a period of up to two years as they engage with the city to create a meaningful interaction with Glasgow-based individuals, collectives and organisations.

By doing this, we invent new ways of interacting through art. However this represents a risk – we are testing out what engagement can be and what participation can consist of every day. We carry out unknown processes with artists, activists, scholars and participants. By experimenting with new actions, we can transform the concept of what public engagement is, as well as what public space means. We aim to create new tools and methodologies capable of respecting and representing everyone involved in the programme. There is no doubt, of course, that by operating in this way the discipline becomes more difficult to grasp and define as it turns into something hybrid that moves between art, society and the everyday.

Why would we embark on this challenge? We want to involve wider creativity and inventiveness, and to be able to share areas emerging from a real mix of knowledge where visual art is not the only reference. This can be summarised in a definition of art as a form of citizenship. In other words, by defining civic art as a way of contributing to society through creativity and by integrating creativity into ordinary life.
