THE SKINNY

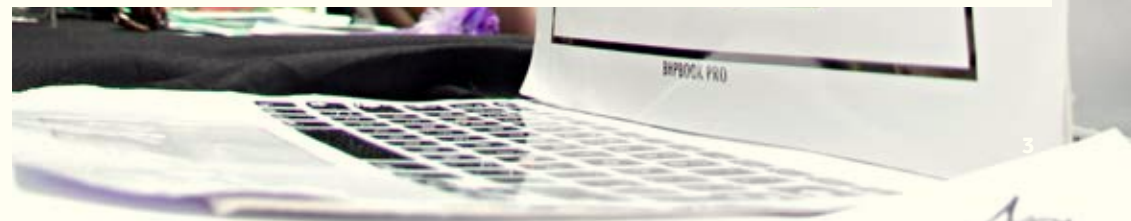


It's a strong season across the board. There is, for instance, a masterclass with Alasdair Gray and a much-anticipated exhibition – *fugue states* – with Allison Gibbs and Lauren Gault. Comic Con too lands at CCA in July, an instant success when it first came here and an expanding phenomenon ever since. Additionally there is a screening of Am Bràighe's *Am Bayou*, tracing the development of Blair Douglas' music from Runrig to Louisiana and Donal McLaughlin, author of *Beheading the Virgin Mary*, leads an event on European literature in translation.

Claire Shallcross and Georgia Horgan are the two artists-in-residence in the Creative Lab through this season while Sarah Rose and Patrick Cole will present exhibitions in Intermedia Gallery. All should be well worth investigating. Also during this time, the Norwegian artist Mai Hofstad Gunnes will be in the CCA artist's flat for the final five month exchange within the High-North residency programme. For more on our Creative Lab residencies, see this brochure's editorial.

Finally there will be a tribute to the amazing Ian Smith of Mischief La-Bas who passed away last August. Through a range of exhibitions and screenings, the three day celebration of Ian's work will span his work in music, comedy, art and performance from the Zap Club in Brighton through twenty-five years of work with Mischief in Glasgow.

JERWOOD / FVU AWARDS 2015: 'WHAT WILL THEY SEE OF ME?'

LUCY CLOUT / MARIANNA SIMNETT

This exhibition premieres two significant new commissions by Lucy Clout and Marianna Simnett, the winners of the Jerwood/FVU Awards 2015, a major initiative for early career artists working in moving image.

The exhibition title 'What Will They See of Me?' alludes to the pressures (and perils) of visibility in a digital world, where images of the self are routinely circulated and exchanged, but also reflects underlying insecurities about personal identity and, beyond that, wider anxieties about what we might be leaving behind for posterity.

Lucy Clout's *From Our Own Correspondent* considers how the rolling deadlines and insistent demands of round-the-clock news reporting are making their presence felt. Trained to put their subject first and their personal opinions second, today's journalists are also finding (like so many of us) that work is dominating life as a whole. Filmed in a series of anonymous hotel rooms, as if to show how the line between home and work is becoming ever more blurred, Clout's video combines interviews with writers, bloggers and other media figures with moments of reverie and fantasy.

Marianna Simnett's *Blood* has the unsettling familiarity of a fairytale. Continuing the artist's fascination with childhood rites of passage, it pivots around the young protagonist Isabel, following a surgical procedure to her nose. Alternating between the confines of her sickbed and the mountain landscapes of Albania, the film is punctuated by enigmatic scenes in which Isabel is both shadowed and protected by Lali, an Albanian sworn virgin. Lali's disavowal of her biological sex causes Isabel to question her own path to adulthood, and prompts us to consider how identity is not always in the blood but increasingly in our own hands.

FUGUE STATES

LAUREN GAULT & ALLISON GIBBS

Sat 25 July - Sun 6 September

Lauren Gault and Allison Gibbs come together for the first time in a two-person exhibition investigating the margins of sight, sense and connectedness. Positioning their research around the reception and transmission of information, the artists explore metaphysical and unverifiable qualities of materials, objects and processes to survey how the sensory may function; how it may have evolved.

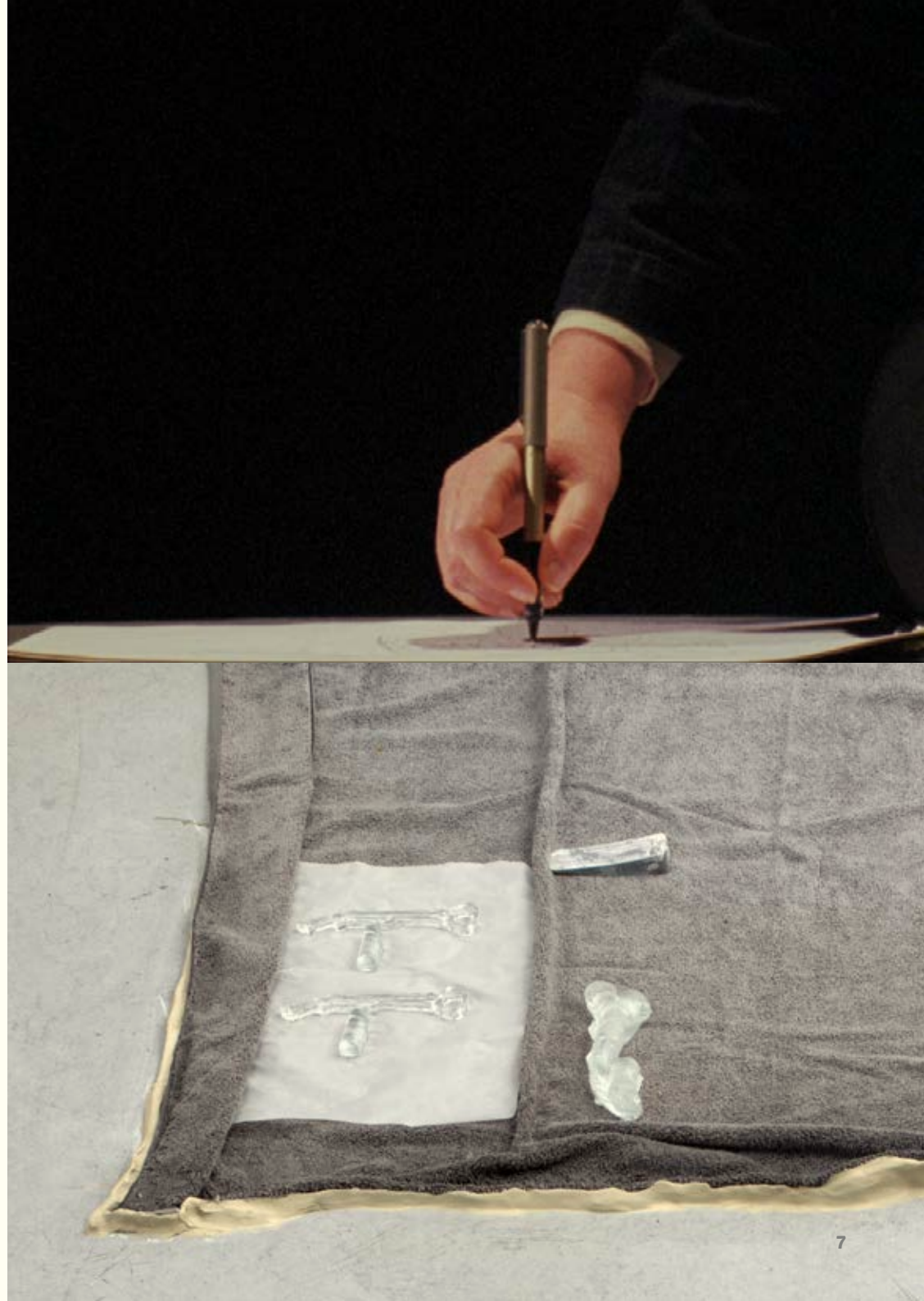
The exhibition has facilitated a communal, cross-continental enquiry, sharing research and writing into the properties (alchemical, technological, biological, biographical) of materials and objects, as well as imagery and forms suggestive of physical and psychological states – wet, dry, geographical, psychogenic. The term ‘fugue’, as in music, intimates this multi-timbral process of building the show, but also suggests a context of altered thought and consciousness to situate each practice. Pulling apart these collective ideas, the artists investigate how time and future can be re-expressed and understood.

Allison Gibbs’ work is often the result of research, writing and workshops in the form of scripted film installations, development circles and more recently, performances. Her new work *Our Extra-Sensory Selves* attempts to consider and invoke the possibilities of becoming extra-sensory, enacting and re-voicing experiences shared by the participants of A Development Circle for Radical Subjectivity and extra-sensory practitioners. Her current research is informed by the psychic qualities of minerals and the writing of Jane Roberts (1929-1984), an American author and medium who channelled an “energy personality essence” called Seth. For *fugue states* Gibbs expands and reimagines *Our Extra-Sensory Selves* into an installation to include new film, sound and object elements.

Lauren Gault’s sculptural, written and performance-based practice looks at the resonant quality of materials; how objects can evoke more intangible experiences, such as a period of time, a place or a presence. States and thresholds are hugely significant within her practice, often using materials which highlight or control state-change in an attempt to expose, suspend and understand these moments of flux. The barrier and evolution of language too is important as Gault considers how contemporary digital communications may be contributing to a de-evolution of our sensory abilities. Reanimating found objects and sculpture, Gault aims to present the voice of objects, exploring how knowledge or energy can be channelled through their forms, ultimately surveying how we can experience the past or future through matter.

A DEVELOPMENT CIRCLE FOR RADICAL SUBJECTIVITY

A Development Circle is a type of meeting group normally found in spirit mediumship contexts that aims to enable members of the group to improve their practical and spiritual skills together. Creative Lab Residency

GEORGIA HORGAN

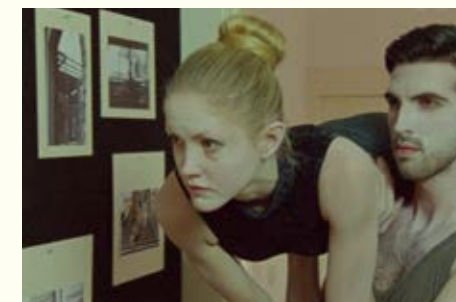

As part of an extended research project into the relationship between the growth of industry in Scotland and patterns of witch-hunting, during her residency Georgia will consider how women's history is communicated within museological contexts, particularly in institutions or public spaces local to witch-scares.

HIGH-NORTH RESIDENCY

High-North is an ambitious three-year artists' residency initiative linking Tromsø (Norway), Gateshead/Newcastle (England) and Glasgow (Scotland). The project is coordinated by NABROAD, and supported by Arts Council Norway, and The Royal Norwegian Embassy, London.

Norwegian artist Mai Hofstad Gunnes works with film, collage, and installation. In Glasgow (1 July – 30 Nov), Hofstad Gunnes will continue to explore ideas connected to production of subjectivity in relation to how we handle and understand images today.



Dublin born artist Declan Clarke will head to Tromsø in 2015. He works predominately in film. His films reflect on everyday experiences and contrasts these with grand narratives and explorations of the historical edifices of political power.

THE PRINTER'S DEVIL SARAH ROSE

Sun 12 – Sat 25 July

The Printer's Devil is a new installation that considers practices of information proliferation and the identity of destabilised materials. Influenced by the extra-informational qualities of oral communication, the exhibition includes audio and sculptural approaches. The installation results in a series of rumours: corrupted translations, cumulative error, abstractions, and transformations.

Printing was a process once guarded in secrecy and associated with the supernatural, and a Printer's Devil was the name given to the apprentice of the printer's workshop. This exhibition explores issues of authorship, authenticity and decay engaging with complicated understandings of subjectivity and biography.

A COWBOY'S RITE OF PASSAGE PATRICK COLE

A Cowboy's Rite of Passage will be a performance exhibition which will seek to create a humorous catharsis for the viewer. Adhering to the tradition of the bard, this exhibition will reference elements of collective experience intertwined with cowboy culture.

In the latter part of the seventeenth century the idea of the 'bard' came to mean an epic author, singer or narrator. The bard's stories would often satirise society, acting as a social cleanser and as kind of relief for the general public.

Self-proclaimed 'jack of all trades, master of none', Ian was actually a master at exploiting and juxtaposing different art forms, including visual art, comedy, performance, compering, music, cartoons, street theatre and TV. A maestro of the quick idea, he made new and accessible work while supporting and encouraging artists of all kinds.

Festival of Ian Smith will give a flavour of this work: from his early days in Brighton, through his 'pulptures' ("like paintings or sculptures but not as good"), to stints as ringmaster with Circus Archaos, TV persona Monty Cantsin, and his twenty two years as Director of Glasgow's Mischief La-Bas.

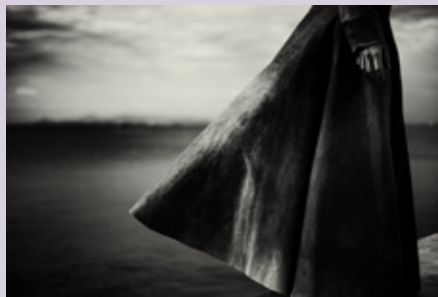

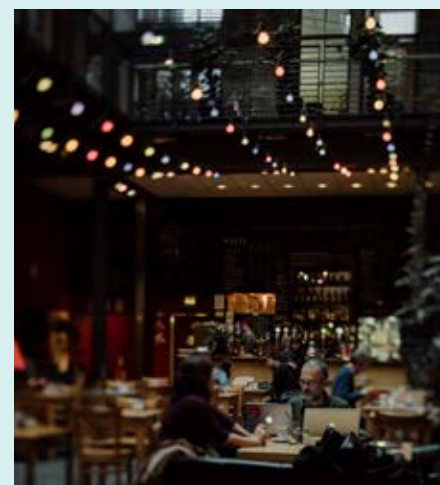
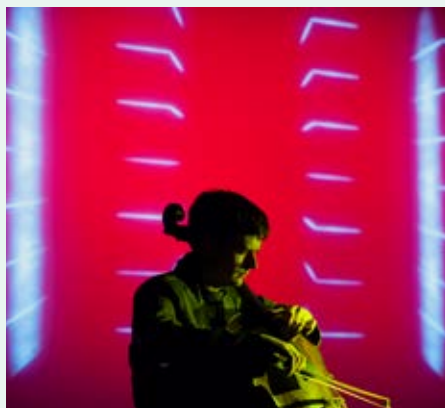

CCA: Editorial

CREATIVE LAB

Creative Lab residencies in CCA began in 2003. They were sporadic at first but gradually settled into a regular pattern of twelve monthly residencies each year.

Early residencies were in the space now dedicated to Intermedia gallery and they were only programmed in when that room was not in use for larger CCA exhibitions. It was clear though that demand for a residency space – even such a basic room – was outstripping available opportunities. In 2006, a large office on the first floor was emptied and became the new home of the Creative Lab, offering a more consistent programme across the whole year.

Since then, the Lab residencies have always been selected through an open submission process. Research is our priority in the selection of applications and there is no demand for a tangible outcome. Equally, the residencies are not linked to exhibitions and are not geared towards the exhibition of finished pieces in that space. Artists are free to devise new work, to experiment, to collaborate with others in areas outside their usual practice or simply to think, in a space distanced from everyday work or social constraints. There is an opportunity to open the doors to the public at the end of a residency and discuss the month's activity or for a sharing in dance or performance residencies. Artists often use the room for screenings, workshops and critiques throughout the residency, and CCA provide marketing and technical support for these events. Artists can also use CCA's equipment, including our dance floor, projectors, sound kit and lights to experiment and research on their own. CCA staff also offer feedback on work at times when invited to do that and, more generally, there is an immense benefit to the regular presence of artists in the building, reminding us why we are actually here.

Every year the demand for the Creative Lab residencies grows, perhaps reflecting artists' need for an unpressured space to think and experiment. An important facet of the Creative Lab is that it fosters a meaningful and long-lasting relationship between CCA and a new set of artists, often resulting in future collaborations and further, ongoing support. The month-long residencies allow the CCA programmers to be part of the development process, allowing for time to explore the artists' research without exerting curatorial demands. Through our discussions we can more fully understand and support the process of making the work without giving a deadline to produce it. These encounters are often followed up in later months and years. In recent months, artists such as Kathryn Elkin, Grace Shwindt, Catherine Street, Julia Scott, Mother Tongue, Jer Reid and Rob Churm have all had events, support or opportunities following residencies in the space. We will continue to work with all of our Creative Lab alumni to create introductions to other groups and artists, and feed their research in to other activities taking place in the building.

One of the lesser-known spaces in the CCA is our artist's flat on the third floor overlooking Scott Street. It's a small space but it's an invaluable asset as it allows us the flexibility to host residencies with minimal accommodation costs. In relation to the Creative Lab, it is used by residents coming from further afield. At other times, it hosts separate

longer-term residencies, such as the High North exchange programme or our long-standing artist exchange with Quebec. This space means that artists who are strangers to the city have a friendly, welcoming base, facilitating a wider exchange with the building users, staff and cultural tenants.
